Publisher, Tom Tesnow, has decided to say farewell to his long-running publication after 40 years but has no plans to relinquish his band manager status just yet, continuing to book bands as he has done since the 1980s. He is planning two farewell parties on successive Saturdays in August - on the 14th and 21st of the month - in Center Line, Michigan (See inside back cover for address and schedule of events.) The events will include several bands each day along with four 50/50 raffles at each event, with tickets to benefit The Center Line Lions Club on both dates. There will also be a donation table for the **Historical Society of Center** Line. A good time will be had by all!

## HUMBLE BEGINNINGS

Tom was born in Findlay, Ohio in 1952 to very humble beginnings. His father, Bob, was a steel lathe operator at Garwood Industries and his mother, Sue, was a waitress and cook. Their modest house (out in a heavily wooded area) had no inside plumbing; they didn't have inside plumbing until Tom entered high school. He began playing music at a young age with his two brothers, Larry and Ron, five and ten years older, respectively.



Tom got his first drum kit at the age of 13, but before that, his talent was revealed as he drummed on one-, two-, and three-pound cans of Maxwell House coffee that his mom gave him - a true sign of someone born with the beat! His brothers, Ron and Larry, and Tom formed the **Tesnow Brothers Band**.



They played at Tom's high school, campgrounds and bars. His first paid gig with an outside band happen when he was 15. Tom would sit in with local talent whenever he could.

When his brother, Ron, joined the Navy the brothers began playing in different states where Ron was stationed including Virginia, Ohio, and Michigan. They played together until Ron was stationed out of the country.

## MAJOR MUSICAL INFLUENCES

"I saw Minnie Pearl at an event in Findlay, but unfortunately never had the pleasure of meeting her." Like many other Baby Boomers in the 1960s, Tom was influenced by the Beatles, as well as Credence Clearwater Revival (CCR), George Jones, Jerry Lee Lewis (interviewed by Tom later for this magazine), Willie Nelson, Carl Perkins, Jack Greene, Johnny Cash, Merle Haggard, Waylon Jennings, Roger Miller "King of the Road"... and last but not least, "Elvis Presley, of course!"

## **ON THE ROAD**

From 1971 to about 1975, brothers Tom and Larry Tesnow and Denny Lytle formed the band, **Green River.** "We loved doing CCR, and that was one of their songs!"



Tom left the band and hit the road with his first wife, Beth, and eight-week-old daughter, Traci, in the hopes of some day being Elvis Presley's drummer. ("Boy was I ever naive back then") joining Larry Lee and the Rascals in Minneapolis/St. Paul. They performed there, St. Cloud, and other Minnesota cities. They performed covers from Elvis, CCR, Merle Haggard, Waylon Jennings, and many more top radio-played artists; Tom would pull out the Gene Krupa drum solo from Caravan. With the usual drama and bad habits bands tend to find while living on the road, Tom eventually quit the band.

Tom's agent, Norm Forest, got him an opportunity to form a band to back up The Hager Twins from Hee-Haw fame, for a couple fair shows.



"We rehearsed Jim and John's (Hager) album. 'Motherhood, Apple Pie, and the Flag' and we had a great time. The Hagers really enjoyed my daughter, Traci; although, she was too young to remember that time. Jim was playing my Yamaha accoustic when he accidently bumped it on a bleacher bench at the fairground and made a little crack at the bottom of it. At the time, I was just happy that he was playing on it."

Tom's agent then contacted him to see if he was interested in moving to Colorado Springs to join **The Vern Thomson Show** at a club known as, **The Godfather**, playing six days a week. Tom accepted and he and his young family headed for Colorado Springs. "Being that I was playing Country & Western, Elvis songs, and Rock & Roll, I never really heard of Western Swing, which I had to learn in the band. Vern (bandleader) was from Waco, Texas and played fiddle, lead guitar, and sang with a strong low Texas voice. He was formerly a drummer in Texas and moved up to Colorado Springs to front his own band. He turned out to be a great friend and showed me how to play Western Swing on the drums. We played all over Colorado and Texas. We were a six-piece band and covered most of the top country songs on the radio."

"While living in Colorado Springs, I also secretly moonlighted playing guitar and singing during the afternoon happy hours to make extra money. Sometimes the job interfered with band rehearsals, until the band surprised me a couple months later and came to the club in the audience I was playing and gave me an ultimatum to quit moonlighting or leave the band. I staved with the band."

"The band also was offered to do some studio work in Denver about 60 miles north of Colorado Springs with Jody Copley and I played on 'Ain't That My Luck' and the B Side 'I Can't Help It (If I'm Still in Love with You)'."



Feeling the strain of the road with his wife and daughter, and trying to save the marriage, Tom left Vern Thomson and headed back East. "It was one of the hardest things I ever had to do was to quit Vern and the band. We both were in tears and hoped that one day we could perform together again. Unfortunately, that never happened." (Editor's note: A local known fiddler, **Billy Hamblin** (currently with Family Tradition) also played in Vern Thomson's band a couple years after Tom left the band. Then Billy and Tom met later in the Detroit Metro Area and Billy has played for **Arizona Son**, a band that Tom has formed over 20 years ago.

Tom took a job in Salina, Kansas with Red Young and The Youngins. "I learned a lot from Red and his band. He had recorded a country song that was being played on local radio stations in Kansas, and had a great style - not only country, but different kinds of music including the Grateful Dead. I played with the band that whole summer and felt I had to leave for Ohio to try to save my marriage. The band didn't want me to leave the group, so they came with me. That was incredible even though there wasn't enough work for an outof-state band, and we didn't have an agent to help us at the time."

"Eventually, Red and the band went back to Kansas. A few months later Red asked me to play drums with him for an audition in Kansas City, Missouri, which I did, and then I returned to Ohio. After a marriage separation for a period of time, we ended up getting a divorce. I stayed in the area performing to be in touch with my daughter."

Traci, like her father, is musically inclined (brass instruments) and is now 46 years old. She attended Bowling Green State University after high school and has accomplished so much in her personal and professional life. Presently, she is the Marketing and Business Development Leader at Nooter Toledo. She is also very involved in her community and serves as Vice President on her local school board. Traci has a successful and supportive husband, Mike, who is also musical (played guitar in numerous bands when he was younger) and is the Director of Operations at a specialty metals company with locations in Michigan and Arizona. They have two beautiful and intelligent children. Tom's grandson, Logan (16), is a high honors student and plays the drums. His granddaughter, London (11), loves school and joins the band this year playing percussion or the trombone (she's undecided). Tom is very proud of all of them!

"I had formed a band in Norwalk, Ohio, where we played in Port Clinton. Sandusky, Fremont and other clubs around Lake Erie. In the meantime, after leaving him a few years before in St. Paul, Larry Lee wanted me to play drums and sing with his band again and was trying to track me down until he found me at the club I was playing in Norwalk. He asked me to rejoin his new band and move from Ohio. He really liked my high harmonies in the band and gave me the name, "Tender Tom" in the band because I liked singing a lot of love ballads." Tom laughs. "Larry had an agent, Paul Wade, who owned International Talent Agency out of Michigan who booked Larry and the band in Minnesota, Indiana, and in Michigan."

While playing at this club in Canton called 'The Red Door Lounge' (later called Lucille's) we were trading every other set with an Elvis impersonator called, Elvis Shelton, which local guitarist, Tommy Buck was playing with Shelton. When Larry Lee, Junior (our guitar player,) and I were outside on our break having a cigarette, this bass player, Paul (Wiley) Smith, who wasn't old enough to come into the club, came up to Larry, and asked him if he was the band leader, and Larry said, Yes, what's up? Paul said that he was listening outside and said the bass player was lousy, and Larry should give Paul an audition and gave him his card. Junior and I was laughing about it, because Paul

didn't know that he was talking to the bass player (Larry) and left. Larry (being a guitar player) could not sing and play bass very well at the same time. Larry said to Junior and I, 'What do you think of that? I told Larry that he should give Paul an audition. He did and hired him!

"There was this time in November where we played in Wayne, Michigan, and the owner of the club booked us for two weeks. After finishing the first week, the owner told Larry that he had double booked another band by mistake. As a road band you normally lived paycheck to paycheck, and we weren't expecting to be off for a week. The club owner told Larry that he could come back and play for their New Year's Eve party. Larry said okay, but we would not be back to set up until early evening on New Year's Eve, because we were coming from out of town. New Year's Eve came and we were performing in Morton, Minnesota. So the club owner in Wayne had no band that night! Although Larry and the band got screwed out of that week, so did the owner on New Year's Eve night. We were never invited to come back to that club in Wayne again. Larry seemed to always know what to do for things like that! lol"



In 1979 Tom and Paul Smith played on Larry Lee's, "The One Who's Always Cheating (Got Cheated on Tonight)" and "Gonna Have Happy Days." I remember Paul and I driving on the Interstate when the "The **One Who's Always Cheating**" came on the air, and we were very happy and excited! Larry Lee changed his band name to Larry Lee Adkins and the Hanging Tree. Larry went on to Nashville to record a number one favorite on WCXI in Detroit. "Hey Mister (I'm In Love with Your Wife") which got a lot of airplay in the area. "We ended up doing a house gig at a club in Mt. Clemens called the Hayloft. Larry Lee and I had our differences, mainly with the other band members and myself. In a period of about four or five years, I quit Larry Lee twice, and he fired me twice, but we remained friends."

### PUTTING DOWN ROOTS... BUT NOT STOPPING!

Tesnow met his second wife, Christine, in 1979, decided to make Michigan his home, and got off the road. Tom and Christine quickly fell in love, married, and added to the family as Christine had two children from a previous marriage, Lisa and Steven.

Tom played with several different bands including The Ted York Show, Dave Atkins and Guy Clark, Swanee Caldwell, Southern Breeze (now Cadillac Cowboys), the Bob Moss Band, and other gigs in Michigan and Canada. While playing with The Ted York Show in Windsor, Ted booked studio time in Nashville and the next morning after playing Windsor we were heading

to Nashville, "I decided to quit the band because I didn't want to leave Christine. A few weeks later, I still went down to Nashville to write, play and see if there was a place for me there. I stayed with a friend, X Lincoln (cousin to Justin Tubb), and the highlight of being down there was playing at the Possum Holler in Printer's Alley (at that time owned by Kenny Rogers, because George Jones lost the club due to bankruptcy,) and being at the Grand Ole Opry backstage with all the entertainers."

## A VENTURE INTO PUBLISHING

While playing drums in a band for Dave Atkins, who published Country in The City News out of Romulus, Dave asked Tom to write about local and regional events in Macomb & Oakland counties. Dave sent Tom to the Silverdome to interview George Jones, Tammy Wynette, Carl Perkins, father/ daughter duo The Kendalls, Don Gibson, and others. "George Lindsey, well-known for his role as Goober on the Andy Griffith Show, was emcee of the event and taught me what to ask and be myself during an interview." East Side News became a regular column in Atkins' paper. Some of Tom's articles made it to other, larger publications around the United States.

Just over a year later Tom and Dave had a disagreement regarding advertising found commissions and themselves as competitors. Tom decided to publish his own East Side News Country Magazine and began selling advertising and writing. He learned more about publishing from libraries and friends. Ron Fredrick (currently a council member at St. Clair Shores), had a publication called "What's On" with cable and TV listings. Tom saw the publication at a store, and decided to call Ron and he helped Tom launch the first issue; his wife, Dar (Darlene) Fredrick did the typesetting for galleys, the proofs before going to press.

## EAST SIDE NEWS TO THE MAGAZINE OF COUNTRY MUSIC



Starting at 3,000 copies a month, the free copies were then dropped off at high-traffic areas such as grocery stores, restaurants, party stores, doctors' offices, etc., which later yielded to a readership of over 40,000. An ingenious method for exposure of the new publication!

"If it wasn't for God, family, and business friends encouraging me to continue and 'Keep It Country,' I wouldn't have made it 40 plus years."

"I do want to recognize Blue Grass writer, Barb Zill, who started writing for me in June of 1981 until now; Scott C. Price for doing dozens of interviews (the last one a few years ago with Eric Burdon of the Animals); Scott Colburn, of Scott Colburn Western Wear in Livonia, was a big supporter of The Magazine of Country Music (MCM) and I for over 40 years; 9 Mile Rental in Warren also advertising with me for over 40 years; my son, Steven Fogel, who has worked with me for over 20 years; my son, Tommy Jr., for working with the MCM and my band projects for over 20 years as well. There are a lot of people to thank, but there wouldn't be enough pages through all these years, so Thank You!"



## ALAN TURNER NEW ALBUM OUT MID-AUGUST 2021!

Alan Turner is set to release a brand-new album featuring several hit singles he's put out in the last couple years. *That's Why They Make Beer, Let Go* and recent single, *Vintage* are all part of the 12 song compilation called "Captain Ron's Lost Hacienda".

"We were up in northern Minnesota performing at the Shooting Star Casino in -24 degree weather in January and looking forward to an upcoming show the following week in the much warmer Key West, Florida... when the idea came to me. So we all spent the weekend joking about my sound engineer, Ron (who I call Captain Ron), owning a tropical resort off the cost of Mexico... the following week a song was written, called **Captain Ron's Lost Hacienda** and the title track of the next album was born." Remarked Alan.

This marks the 6th studio album Alan has put out and is released through his label MC1 Nashville and distributed by SONY Music the Orchard.

## ROLLOR



In 1984, Rollor "rolled" off the presses as a complement to East Side News, covering rock and roll, R&B, punk, and new wave acts such as Michael Jackson, The Gregg Allman Band, Billy Joel, Berlin, and Stevie Ray Vaughn. Tom's first interview for the Rollor Magazine was with The Tubes ("White Punks on Dope"). It was the craziest concert I ever went to that the band was dressed in retro English Clothes, with High Heels and sniffing their snuff boxes while singing their number one hit, and the audience standing on their chairs chanting, "White Punks On Dope!" It was a great interview later and I never will forget the setting that night?"

The publication ran for eight months until Tom had his second cancer surgery – more on that later - and decided to continue the Country Music Magazine and drop *Rollor*. He was selling advertising from his hospital bed while recovering from surgery.

" I was in my hospital bed in pain although the medicines sure helped a lot. The patient in the bed next to me was asking what I was doing on the phone all the time selling advertisement, etc." I said I was in business for myself, and no one else would be doing it for me."

#### FOREVER COUNTRY

WCXI and W4 were the country music radio stations that played the latest country songs, and had information, events, entertainment, "and everything country back in those days!"

Also in 1984, during the Marlboro Country Concert at the Joe Louis Arena, Tom was interviewing Merle Haggard for the fourth time or so. Haggard brought Tom on the stage with him while he performed his show. What a thrill for Tom to see the concert from the stage itself! "When Merle was done with his show, he introduced me to the audience and showed the magazine and yelled to them to look for him on the cover of next month's publication." The country magazine could not have received any better exposure than that! Merle use to pose with other artists for me to take photos of them together."

In 1989, Tom's Country Magazine was asked to be the Country Music Media Sponsor for a huge show at the Silverdome in Pontiac called, 'This Country's Rockin.' "Ted Nugent was the emcee, and they had some great Rock & **Roll and Country national acts** including Carl Perkins, Dwight Yoakam. Sawyer Brown, **Desert Rose Band, Highway** 101, Stray Cats, Steven Stills, and many more. It ran from 3:00pm until 3:00am. It was two weeks before the regular Downtown Hoedown at the Hart Plaza in Detroit, when a

call came from California asking me to promote 'This Country's Rockin'. PBS aired it on television on July 4th for the next six years."

In the ensuing years, Tesnow created the band, Arizona Son, and at one time had over 100 bands on his booking roster, booking locally and internationally in the United States and Canada.

He presently manages and books Devin Scillian with Arizona Son. Devin, is a prominent anchor for Channel 4 News in Detroit, as well as being a talented singer, songwriter, and author of many children's books.



"It's been almost 20 years since I have been working with Devin – he's such a great 'down to earth' person on and off the air!"

Tom has been booking and promoting the **Tommy Steele Band for** a long time, all over the country including Las Vegas, Tulsa, Wyoming, Wisconsin, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and many more states.



"One of my favorite songs of Tommy Steele that really got me hooked was 'Forever 17'. He has over 8 videos televised all over the country with a recent #1 song in Italy (of all places.)" Tommy has shared the stage with a lot of national acts as well as being the headliner himself.

"Alan Turner and the Steel Horse Band is a big supporter of the magazine, which even though he has his own booking agent, I get a few bookings for him every year as well. He has many songs released and he also shared the stage with Kenny Rogers before Kenny passed away. Alan does a Kenny Rogers Tribute Show now in memory of his friend."



favorite Elvis Tom's impersonator is Sherman Arnold who has been performing since 1955. He also does tributes to Roy Orbison and Marty Robbins, and has been inducted into the Country Music Tribute Artists Hall of Fame as well as other awards. "I have so much respect for Sherman. He's from the old school and still calls an egg, an egg! He says that he is not Elvis, and that he only sings a tribute to the 'King!' One of my favorite songs that Sherman sings is Sonny James "Young Love!"



Tom has booked many Nashville national acts including John Anderson, Terri Clark, Peggy Lee, Ronnie McDowell, John Conley and others.

"I used to work at a supper club called 'The Northwind' near Findlay, Ohio, where my mom, Sue Tesnow, was a waitress and got me a job in the kitchen (at 12 years old) washing dishes and stocking the beer coolers. They had a speaker in the kitchen, and they played country music on the radio. "One of my earliest influences in country music was Jack Greene. He won the first CMA Award 'Song of the Year' for "There Goes My Everything," which was number one on the country charts for seven straight weeks. Little did I know that I would be in a band in Colorado Springs years later opening for him while he traveled with Ernest Tubb and the Texas **Troubadours. About 15 years** later, I had him come up from Nashville, and my band learned all his songs and backed him for four shows."

The oldest band Tom has written about has been around since 1979: founder, **Rick Niemi's band, Shotgun Willie.** 



"One time I had an interview to do a Downriver (southern suburban Detroit) Country

Show with Michelle Wright "Take It Like A Man," arranged just before she did her show. When I got out of the car in the parking lot, I heard a big roar from the crowd, and thought I had missed my interview with Michelle, but turned out it was for Shotgun Willie. That was the first time I had heard that kind of thundering response for a local band. It was great!"

### GOD, FAMILY, COMMUNITY

Tom had a medical diagnosis of cancer – melanoma surgery, then lymph node cancer that led to a devastating prognosis of six months to live. He had a family, including two small children, and a loving wife. He could not conceive of them having to live without a father and husband around. Tom gave his life to Jesus Christ and testifies that God saved his life and soul. Tom told this writer that since 1984, "everything else is gravy"!

Tom attends a men's weekly prayer group and truly is thankful to God in his everyday life. Since Tom was healed of cancer he felt encouraged to give back to various charities by coordinating many jamborees in southeastern Michigan and Toledo, helping to raise a lot of money and awareness for: The American Cancer Society, Macomb **County Child Abuse Neglect** Information Council (MCCANIC); PAL (Police Athletic League); Muscular **Dystrophy: Shriners Crippled** Children's Hospital and Burn Center; Center Line Lions Club; and many other charities and individuals. He was nominated for the Macomb **County Volunteer of The Year** Award in 1999. Tom is humbled by the recognition, but the work is not done for that reason.

He was asked to join the Center Line Lions Club by sponsor Terry Faulbaum (superintendent of Center Line Schools) that same year, and Tom



is a proud member of the Center Line Lions. "The Center Line Lions Lions (and International) are one of the very few organizations that give back 100% of all their fund raising to the community (members pay their own way). The funds are distributed to Leader Dogs for the Blind, Penrickton Center for Blind Children, Beaumont Silent Children, Juvenile Diabetes **Research Foundation**, Bear Lake, Children's Leukemia Foundation. Scholarships awarded to Center Line High School graduates, and much, much more."

Tom is blessed with a blended family of five children, two together with Christine, ten grandchildren, and another grandchild on the way. As my daughter Traci has said, "We are not half, step or anything else, we are all family!" Tom's wife, Christine, is retired from a local school district and now focuses on caring for the family and spending time with friends.



Their daughter, Tina, went to college at Wayne State University and received her Doctorate in Education from University of Michigan - Dearborn. She currently leads the English as a Second Language (ESL) department at Warren Consolidated Schools. She holds many presentations about ESL and is dedicated to her profession. Tina and her husband are expecting their first child in October.

Tom's family have been extremely supportive of Tom, his music, and the East Side News publications (including The Magazine of Country Music) and they also enjoy hearing local bands, including Arizona Son and Tommy Jr's band!

Tom's youngest son, Tommy Jr., is a musician and began playing drums at 7 years old.

"I was putting on a benefit jamboree at this club called, 'Fat Cat's' in Flat Rock. Tommy came with me, and Tommy would normally do a sound check on the drums for me, so I could go out front and check the balance. Tommy didn't expect this, but I brought my guitar and had the house band, West Texas Wind, start the set early, the house lights went off, stage lights went on, and before Tommy knew it, he was playing drums for the band at 11 years old. The drummer for West Texas Wind came in and was blown away from this young kid playing drums."

Since then, Tommy went to play drums on several U.S. tours. He's played with numerous bands including No Alternative, Alucard, Wyndfall (grammy nominated celtic folk band), Blasé Splee, The None-Others, and now with his own band, The KufflinKs. They tour and



perform at different venues: Cadillac Straits in Madison Heights; Detroit Fleat in Ferndale, and at many city concerts, etc. Tommy Jr. does studio work for artists around the globe, and is also a fine videographer and graphic artist for East Side News and other publications"

## STILL PUBLISHING

Tom Tesnow has always loved American history. In fact, he finished first in his SAT scores to represent his high school at the SAT competition at Findlay College. Bringing that passion forward, Tom also publishes historical anniversary publications for local cities in Oakland and Macomb counties. "I always enjoy historical research and to promote cities, historical commissions and historical societies. These cities all need love and support from their communities - residents as well as business owners - in trving to keep their history alive for all to enjoy. 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## **CHRIS JANSON NEWS**

Acclaimed entertainer Chris **Janson** is known as much for his high-octane performances as he is for championing the people who make country music a community. On August 25 he will take the historic stage at the Ryman Auditorium for the 14th Annual Academy of Country Music Honors as both performer and presenter. Janson will help commemorate the incredible behind-the-scenes talent of country music. To have a local regional magazine is an asset for the artists and clubs and all the venues that they play. To reach the people, advertising is essential. I can personally vouch for the success of advertising.

I will include some of the results of the past years. *The Bluegrass Music International Pickin Magazine* published my interview with the **RFD Boys** of Ann Arbor MI and an article I wrote on **John Morris** and Old Homestead Records in their November 1976 issue.

John Morris and I are in the famous Neil V Rosenberg Bluegrass History Book, the 20th Anniversary Edition.

To add a few other highlights, the Michigan Entertainment Music Magazine Feb. 1978 Tom playing in Adak, Alaska (1974)

within their RFD Boys Article mentioned Barb Zill is their Club Director and the International Fan Club with German and Japanese fans. The RFD Boys had not toured to entertain there yet. They did later on though.

The Ann Arbor News covered the RFD Boys 10th Anniversary party at the Pretzel Bell and made note that I was in charge of promotional and advertising for the RFD Boys. I can say it never seemed like work, it was all fun even though time consuming.

Results of the later The RFD Boys were on the cover of *The Bluegrass Unlimited* May 1975 issue.

Wendy Smith and his band Blue Velvet were in a major article in the April 1984 Bluegrass Unlimited.

I was fortunate to be contacted by the River Park Center in Owensboro Kentucky, they were building a brick walkway to the museum wtih inscriptions. I had them include The RFD Boys and one for Wendy Smith and Blue Velvet. They remain there for all visitors to see since February 1990.

I do need to thank John Morris as he was the one to contact

John Anderson's lead guitar player & Tom's best friend for over 40 years

Wendy Smith for me to manage his Blue Velvet band.
